
THE QUARTERLY REVIEW

INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter showed residents staying the same or improving in most areas with the exception of residents asking for medications. We have instituted an improvement plan for this and chore completion since, although it increased, is still low.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 11 residents participating in our girls' lifeskills program at different times across the quarter and 11 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth was as follows:

Job seeking and Job

performance 4 Residents held jobs

with 100% attendance.

**Scores dropped in most areas due to residents being at work, and two boys refusing the program consistently.

Number of Restraints:

Residents:

We had 8 new residents join us last quarter. A whopping 7 of those were at our boys' home and 1 at our girls' house.

Staff:

Four new staff were added to our group.

Residents:

6 residents were discharged, 2 girls and 4 boys. Best wishes to those moving on to adulthood and families. To the 2 who went to more restrictive settings, we pray that they find success in their new placements.

Staff:

We had to say goodbye to two staff this quarter. Our administrative assistant relocated. A member of our boys' house staff left due to stress of the job. Both will be missed.



Fresh Starts

Six boys and Five girls were eligible to participate in our Aftercare Program in the last quarter.

FUN EXPERIENCES WITHIN OUR COMMUNITY

This quarters earned trip was to Sandusky! There the residents visited the Cedar Point and Putin-Bay.



They learned about the history of the island, ventured into two caves, played putt-putt and enjoyed going into a butterfly house!

IMPROVEMENTS:

The following Improvement Plans were tracked:

Call Log: Logging resident calls and the results of those calls was not consistently occurring, especially in the boys' home. This has improved as far as noting the calls having occurred, but need more improvement noting results of calls on the kids emotions/attitudes.

Medication Log: Residents 16 years of age and older are supposed to ask for their medication to get them in the habit of remembering to take their meds when they age out. Staff are supposed

Boys House: 13 Girls House: 1

The girls' incidents involving restraints decreased from 4 in the previous quarter to 1 this quarter. This is mostly attributed to having a set of residents with less severe behaviors. Also, a resident, whom we have had a long time, showed marked improvement!

The boys home decreased from 19 to 13 incidents involving restraints. We had a decrease in peer to peer incidents, which correlates to these findings. There was no discernable pattern between caregivers performing the restraints or the residents receiving them.



Critical Incidents

Boys

76 CIR's ... a drop from 134 last quarter. Peer to Peer incidents were our highest category, with 30 such incidents. This was followed by incidents of AWOL. We had 18 instances of AWOL, a drop from 34 of last quarter.

Girls

28 CIR's ... No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc. The highest behavioral areas were in sexualized behaviors and AWOL, but the numbers

-Three boys are doing well in family units.

-Two boys successfully graduated the program.

- One male resident timed out of the program. We lost contact with him in June. At that time, he had a construction job and was doing well.

-One successfully completed the program.

-Three girls are succeeding in family units.

-We lost contact with one young lady after repeated attempts to communicate with her.

This was not consistently occurring. After studying the issue, it was found that the kids were aware that they were supposed to ask but were not remembering to do it. Children were reminded of the importance of getting into the habit of remembering to take their medication, but little improvement was noted.

New Plan: A new plan has been introduced to increase resident participation in completing packets associated with their goals.

Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 90 or more % of objectives was 2 girls and 1 boy.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 80 -90 % of goals: 4 girls, 0 boys

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 70-80% of goals: 4 Boys, 1 Girl

Residents making progress in, or already having achieved less than 70 % of goals: 5 Boys, 3 Girls

Of the 8 that scored below 70%:

• Three were new residents that had whose goals had only been established a couple of weeks.

Two girls and one boy were non-compliant One was at 68% and was making slow progress. Note: Multiple critical behaviors may be involved in one incident.

*There was an decrease in incidents from last quarter to this quarter in the boys' home and girls' home. This can be attributed to the presenting issues of the children we received.
