

Positive Encounters

INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter showed residents staying close to the same as the previous quarter. We continue to see higher percentages across the board at the girl's house. However, you can see the boys making a better overall effort, there are a few boys noncompliant in the overall independent living program.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 11 residents participating in our girls' life-skills program at different times across the quarter and 6 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth 16 years and older was as follows:

- 11 Total residents 16 or older
- Job seeking and Job performance 3 residents held jobs with 100% attendance. 1 addition got a job however was unable to maintain the job.
- ➢ Meal Planning 70%
- ➢ Shopping 68%
- ➢ Meal Prep 60%
- \succ Chore completion 20%
- ► Laundry completion 70%
- Weekly Life-skills Lessons 82% (10 of 17 residents completed lessons at a 100% rate)
- Remembering to ask for medication: 12%
- 4 of 11 residents completed all aspects of requirements at 100% with exception of asking for medication.

**Scores dropped slightly in areas due to residents being at work, and two boys and 1 girl refusing the program consistently.

We had 6 new residents join us last quarter. A whopping 4 of those were at our girls' home and 2 at our boys' house.

One new male staff was added to our group.

6 residents were discharged, 4 girls and 2 boys. Best wishes to those moving on to families. Especially to our young lady that we had for 4 years that was finally matched with a family, we are thankful to answered prayers. We maintained all of our staff and have the best crew that we have ever had. They are devoted to the care and growth of our young men and women.



The latest news

We have unpacked the new trauma program (TSTFC) to give additional knowledge and skill to staff through this 4-part series. We want to implement some of the practices into our program by utilizing the moment-by-moment assessments to better remediate the behaviors we are seeing in our residents.

Loving to Learn

Our residents our receive their education in the least restrictive environment to best fit their needs. Resident placements as follows:

East Middle School 3 East High School 2 Wilson Alternative 2 Summit Academy 7 Valley Virtual 3 Potential Development 1 Youngstown State University 1 (What an accomplishment! We are so proud of this young lady, 17 and completed her first semester)



We are proud to partner with the faculty at Rush church in Boardman. They have graciously wrapped their arms around our young people. The residents have the opportunity to attend Youth Group on Wednesday evenings and church service on Sundays. 80% of our young people attend and enjoy the experience at rush.

HOW ARE WE BEHAVING?

Number of Restraints:

Boys House: 22

Girls House: 8

The boys home increased from 13 incidents to 22 involving restraints. We got a new resident that disrupted the house as a whole. Restraints occurred due to an increase to peer-to-peer altercations and residents creating an unsafe environment. The resident not only had his own share of the criticals but would encourage others to join him when in behavior. We quickly decided to discharge him after two months of being with us. There was no discernable pattern between caregivers performing the restraints or the residents receiving them.

The girls' incidents involving restraints increased from 4 to 8. This was due to peer-to-peer altercations. However, we saw a steady decrease from October to December in Restraints. In December there were zero restraints.

Fresh Starts

Three boys and Five girls were eligible to participate in our Aftercare Program in the last quarter.

-Three boys are doing well in family units.

-One boy successfully graduated the program.

-Five girls are succeeding in family units.

- One girl successfully graduated the program.



Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 90 or more % of objectives was 3 girls and 1 boy.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 80 -90 % of goals: 2 girls, 0 boys.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 70-80% of goals: 3 Boys, 2 Girl

Residents making progress in, or already having achieved less than 70 % of goals: 6 Boys, 4 Girls

the village network

We are serviced by the Village Network for our counseling, medication management, and group needs.

Those being served are as follows: Individual Counseling-20 Outside counseling- 1 Family Counseling- 5 Medication Management-16 Outside med manage- 1 Resident not on psychotropics- 5 Groups- all residents



Our residents serving others.

Our Community Kitchen has welcomed us, helping them serving others. We had six residents serve with them. Two that completed a community service requirement, one that volunteered for a college requirement and three others just for the experience. What an experience they all had, it left them feeling thankful, grateful, and loved.

Critical Incidents

Boys

107 CIR's ... an increase from 76 the previous quarter. Peer-to-peer altercations were our highest category, with 26 such incidents. This was followed by 17 incidents of AWOL. A determination was made to discharge 3 boys- 1 due to AWOL's, 1 due to total house disruption, and 1 due to extreme aggression & not working the program, charges are pending. This decreased peer-to-peer altercations to 2 in December and AWOL's also decreased to 2.

Girls

36 CIR's ... No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc. The highest behavioral areas were in restraints which were 13 of 8 incident reports, from 8 incidents of peer-to-peer altercations. However we saw a steady decrease from October to December with 0 restraints in December and only 2 incidents of peer-to-peer altercations. Also note, 9 incidents were non-routine medical treatment from ailments and 14 criticals were other unusual incidents mainly reporting to county and not necessarily behavioral.

Note: Multiple critical behaviors may be involved in one incident.

*There was a decrease in incidents from last quarter to this quarter in the boys' home and girls' home. This can be attributed to the presenting issues of the children we received. Of the 10 that scored below 70%:

- One was a new girl who was at 67%, however, goals had only been established less than a month ago.
- Two boys had ISP reviews with new goals added dropping them to 60% and 68% when in the previous month they were 75% and 80%.
- Two girls and two boys were non-compliant.
- Two boys will have a review completed to see why we are not seeing any progress on them. Both boys made slow to no progress consistently over the three months.

The residents got to experience the vast enormous feel and what life looked like on the Ark. At the Creation Museum the residents walked through the Creation of life and the Universe. The residents also got to interact with the horses at the horse park and walk through the barns.

IMPROVEMENTS:

The following Improvement Plans were tracked:

Call Log: Logging resident calls and the results of those calls was not consistently occurring, especially in the boys' home. This is being completed in both homes at a more consistent rate.

Medication Log: Residents 16 years of age and older are supposed to ask for their medication to get them in the habit of remembering to take their meds when they age out. Staff are supposed to highlight their initial if the resident asks for medication. This was not consistently occurring. This plan was continued into this quarter with little success or improvement. We will be looking to remove this piece of the program in the new year.

New Plan: A new plan has been introduced to increase resident participation in completing packets associated with their goals. Residents have a better success rate of completing them with the help of staff and through rewards.
