INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter we have maintained the life skills program. Residents overall respond to what they are supposed to do with incentives and individualized lessons. As a result, 6 of the 6 areas scored above 70% completion, 1 of 6 areas scored above 80%, and 1 of 6 areas scored above 90%.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 11 residents participating in our girls' life-skills program at different times across the quarter and 7 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth 16 years and older was as follows:

- 9 Total residents 16 or older (7 girls, 2 boys)
- Job seeking and Job performance of the 9 residents 2 held jobs, 1 resident is involved with OOD, several residents working on getting their documents to apply for jobs.
- Meal planning 77%
- Shopping List 75%
- Meal Prep 78%

All residents 14 older

- Chore completion 72%
- Laundry completion 89%
- Weekly Life-skills Lessons 97%, 13 of 18 residents at 100%
- 4 of 18 residents received 75% or more in all areas
- 1 of 18 residents received 80% or more in all areas.
- 2 of 18 residents received 90% or more in all areas.
- 1 of 18 residents received a 100% in all areas

HOW ARE WE BEHAVING?

Positive Performers

We love to catch our young ones doing well. Between both homes we wrote 100 rewards among all residents. We also gave out several weekly rewards for great behavior for those that did not have a critical or minor report in the week.

Number of Restraints:

Boys House: 7 restraints – 3 incident reports. 0 restraints in January 😊.

Girls House: 8 restraints – 5 incidents. 0 restraints in March 😊

The boys' home had 7 incident reports that led to physical restraints. All the restraints were from one young man that continues to dysregulate. We are in deliberation with the county to determine what is best for him.

The girls' home had 8 restraints of 5 incidents and 5 different girls. No patterns.



Fresh Starts

Five boys and seven girls were eligible to participate in our Aftercare Program in the last quarter. Three of the seven girls graduated from the aftercare program leaving four participating at the end of the quarter. Four of the five boys reached the end of the 6-month period of aftercare.

-3 girls graduating from aftercare of the 3 one is doing well in foster care, one reunified with mom and is doing great, and the other is still in bridges, living at MOAB.

- 4 girls participating in aftercare 2 have emancipated, 1 is bridges eligible and doing well, however the other is struggling to become bridges eligible. The other 2 girls have reunited home with their mothers and are doing well.

- The 4 boys that left aftercare, 2 are in foster homes, 1 reunified with mom, and 1 reunified with grandparents.

- The one remaining boy has reunited with mom, but we are currently unable to contact him. However, we will continue to reach out.

Loving to Learn

Our residents receive their education in the least restrictive environment to best fit their needs. Resident placements as follows:

East Middle School 2
East High School 0
Wilson Alternative Middle 3
Summit Academy Elementary 2
Summit Academy Secondary 11
Valley Virtual 2
Cardinal Mooney 1



We continue to partner with the faculty at Rush church in Boardman. The residents can attend Youth Group on Wednesday evenings and church service on Sundays. The youth pastor makes himself available to the homes if needed to help make connections and bridge the gap between the home and church. We currently have approximately 8-12 boys and girls that attend regularly. What a difference the additional support makes in our young people's life.



We are serviced by the Village Network for our counseling, medication management, and group needs.

Out of 21 residents, being served are as follows:

Critical Incidents

Boys

33 CIR's 59 Incidents... this is a substantial decrease from the previous quarter. The highest areas were other unusual incidents with 15 other various incidents, and 7 peer-to-peer altercations with 7 restraints. All three months were evenly distributed January 17, February 21 and March 21 incidents. The consequences served were 63 days of full restriction w 23 incidents and 6 incidents with partial restriction such as loss of video games, restitution, verbal counseling. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Girls

54 CIR's, 78 incidents...the incidents have decreased substantially from the previous quarter. The largest areas of incidents were other unusual incidents, 31 other various incidents. Our staff do a great job of keeping the guardians informed. 9 non-routine medical treatment. January was the highest month with 39 incidents. The consequences served were 49 days of full restriction w 13 incidents and 10 incidents with partial restriction such as loss of devices, offsite privileges, and verbal counseling. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Note: Multiple incident behaviors may be involved in one critical. Other unusual incidents – various are not county/state required reporting.

Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 100% of objectives: 3 girls and 0 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 90%-99% of objectives: 1 girl and 2 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 80 -89 % of objectives: 4 girls and 5 boys.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 73-79% of objectives: 2 girls and 3 Boys.

Result: 21 of 21 making progress in or already achieved 73% or higher of objectives.

OVERALL TOTAL Average –

Girls- ACHIEVED 79%, Made Progress 8%, No progress or have not started 13%

Boys- ACHIEVED 73%, Made progress 15%, No progress or have not started 15%

In February 2025, the 3-month good behavior earned trip was to Skyview Ranch in Millersburg, Ohio. There were 3 boys and 3 girls eligible to attend this trip. The girls backed out at the last moment due to lack of interest. The boys had a great time riding horseback, playing games, and staying in the cabins.
