## INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter we have maintained and increased in all areas of the life skills program. Residents overall respond to what they are supposed to do with incentives and individualized lessons. As a result, 6 of the 6 areas scored above 80% completion, and 5 of 6 areas scored above 90%.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 11 residents participating in our girls' life-skills program at different times across the quarter and 7 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth 16 years and older was as follows:

- 11 Total residents 16 or older (9 girls, 2 boys)
- Job seeking and Job performance of the 11 residents, 4 had jobs, 1 resident is involved with OOD, the remaining residents are working on getting their documents to apply for jobs.
- Meal planning 90%-3% increase
- Shopping List 91% -6% increase
- Meal Prep 90% - 3% increase

### All residents 14 older

- Chore completion 80% - 8% increase
- Laundry completion 96% - 7% increase
- Weekly Life-skills Lessons 97%-5% increase
- 11 of 18 residents received 75% or more in all areas
- 8 of 18 residents received 80% or more in all areas.
- 6 of 18 residents received 90% or more in all areas.
- 2 of 18 residents received a 100% in all areas
- Girls were in 96% and higher of 5 of the 6 on hands areas.

## STAFF AND RESIDENTS BEGINNING WITH US

Residents: We welcomed three new girls and two new boys.

Staff: We hired two new female staff.

## SAYING GOODBYE

Residents:  
Three girls were discharged, one emancipated moving on to college. The other two were emergency placements, one needed a higher level of care agreed upon by county and Redemption House, and the other AWOLed abruptly whereabouts unknown.  
One boy was discharged successfully; he stepped down to a foster placement.

Staff:  
There were three staff that moved on to new endeavors one female and two males. We wish them success at all they put their hands into.

## Critical Incidents

### Boys

23 CIR's 31 Incidents... this is a substantial decrease from the previous quarter 50% decrease in critical, 75% decrease in incidents. The highest areas were 14 incidents of other unusual incidents, 5 peer-to-peer altercations. The largest month with incidents was in August with 14 incidents which are relatively low. July there were 6 incidents and in September 11 incident. The consequences served were 41 days of full restriction 03 13 incidents, 5 incidents with partial restriction, such as no tablet/no phone/no device and or verbal counseling. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

### Girls

71 CIR's, 106 incidents...the incidents have decreased from the previous quarter. The largest areas of incidents were other unusual incidents, 34 other various incidents, and 24 self-mutilations. The consequences served were 53 days of full restriction w 14 incidents and 10 incidents with partial restriction such as verbal counseling, essay paragraph, and loss of tv. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

*Note: Multiple incident behaviors may be involved in one critical. Other unusual incidents – various are not county/state required reporting.*

## Loving to Learn

Our residents receive their education in the least restrictive environment to best fit their needs. Resident placements as follows:

Wooster College 1

## Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 100% of objectives:  
2 girls and 2 boy.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 90%-99% of objectives:  
2 girls and 1 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 80 -89 % of objectives:  
2 girls and 2 boys.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 70-79% of objectives:  
2 girls and 4 boys.

Result: 17 of 19 making progress in or already achieved 70% or higher of objectives.

OVERALL TOTAL Average –  
Girls- ACHIEVED 63%, Made Progress 19%, No progress or have not started 18%

Boys- ACHIEVED 72%, Made progress 14%, No progress or have not started 14%
