INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter we began to look at what is working well and what may need to be amended. Residents overall respond to what they are supposed to do with incentives and group lessons but will start making them more one on one in 2026. As a result, 6 of 6 areas scored above 75%.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 11 residents participating in our girls' life-skills program at different times across the quarter and 8 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth 16 years and older was as follows:

- 13 Total residents 16 or older (9 girls, 4 boys)
- Job seeking and Job performance of the 11 residents, 2 had jobs, 1 resident is involved with OOD, 2 referrals for OOD, and the remaining residents are working on getting their documents to apply for jobs.
- Meal planning 78%
- Shopping List 78%
- Meal Prep 79%

All residents 14 older

- Chore completion 77%
- Laundry completion 93%
- Weekly Life-skills Lessons 93%
- 8 of 19 residents received 75% or more in all areas
- 7 of 19 residents received 80% or more in all areas.
- 5 of 19 residents received 90% or more in all areas.
- 3 of 18 residents received a 100% in all areas

Staff: We hired a new female and male staff.

SAYING GOODBYE

Residents:

Three girls were discharged. One emancipated moving on to Bridges. The other two have moved to a higher level of care. Three boys were discharged. One emancipated into the Bridges program, one reunified home, and the last one to a higher level of care.

Staff:

There were three staff that moved on to new endeavors one female and two males. We wish them success in all they put their hands into.

We continue to partner with the faculty at Rush church in Boardman. The residents can attend Youth Group on Wednesday evenings and church service on Sundays. We currently have approximately 8-12 boys and girls that attend regularly on Wednesday's and Sunday's.

HOW ARE WE BEHAVING?

Positive Performers

We love to catch our young ones doing well. Between both homes we wrote 197 rewards among all residents. We also gave out several weekly rewards for great behavior for those that did not have a critical or minor report during the week.

Number of Restraints:

Boys House: 13 restraints – 9 Incidents
Girls House: 4 restraints – 3 Incidents 0 restraints in December 😊

At the boys' home in October there was one peer to staff. November there were 5 restraints from 4 incidents of the same boy over a few week period. He was able to regulate at the end of the month. In December there were 7 restraints from 4 incidents and 4 different occasions with 4 different boys. This is typical around the holiday; emotions run high and can lead to physical aggression.

The girls' home had 3 restraints from two incidents from a peer-to-peer altercation or attempted peer-to-peer between two girls, which was handled quickly and mediation was successfully completed between them. Same girl was the aggressor in both incidents. The other restraint was a peer aggressing toward a staff which was handled swiftly and quickly. No restraints in December. No injuries and no patterns.

Fresh Starts

Three boys and three girls were eligible to participate in our Aftercare Program in the last quarter.

-One girl graduated from after-care. She continues to thrive. She is living at MOAB House, an independent living home, and completed her first semester at YSU. We are so proud of her!

- Two girls remain in after-care; both girls emancipated the foster care system both Bridges eligible. One is at MOAB House and is working in the community. The other is attending Wooster College and living on campus. We are so proud of both young ladies.

- Three boys are in our aftercare program. One is still successful in his foster home. One was reunified with his mom and doing well. One boy emancipated and moved to MOAB House and has transitioned well.



We are serviced by the Village Network for our counseling, medication management, and group needs.

Out of 22 residents, being served are as follows:

- Individual Counseling-22
- Outside counseling- 0
- Family Counseling- 3
- Outside family Counseling -0
- Medication Management-17
- Outside med management- 0
- Residents not on psychotropics- 5
- Group Sessions- 22
- Outside IOP-0
- Outside Case Management-3



Critical Incidents

Boys

31 reportable CIR's 40 Incidents... The highest areas were 13 restraints from aggression, 9 sent home from school/suspensions. It is typical to see an increase due to dysregulation nearing the holidays. All three months, about the same at 13-14 incidents a month No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Girls

56 reportable CIR's, 66 incidents...the incidents have decreased from the previous quarter. The largest areas of incidents were 30 incidents of self-mutilation, 11 non-routine medical treatment. October was the highest month of incidents with a steady decrease coming into December. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Note: Multiple incident behaviors may be involved in one critical. Other unusual incidents – various are not county/state required reporting.

Loving to Learn

Our residents receive their education in the least restrictive environment to best fit their needs. Resident placements as follows:

East Middle School 1
East High School 1
Wilson Alternative Middle 1
Summit Academy Elementary 1
Summit Academy Secondary 11
Valley Virtual 3
Mahoning Valley Community 4

Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 100% of objectives:
3 girls and 3 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 90%-99% of objectives:
2 girls and 3 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 80 -89 % of objectives:
2 girls and 2 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 70-79% of objectives:
2 girls and 1 boy.

Result: 18 of 21 making progress in or already having achieved 70% or above of objectives.

OVERALL TOTAL Average –
Girls- ACHIEVED 73%, Made Progress 14%, No progress or have not started 13%

Boys- ACHIEVED 72%, Made progress 19%, No progress or have not started 9%
