INDEPENDENT LIVING

This past quarter we have maintained and increased in all areas of the life skills program. Residents overall respond to what they are supposed to do with incentives and individualized lessons. As a result, 6 of the 6 areas scored above 75% completion, and 4 of 6 areas scored above 90%.

The results from this most recent quarter are as follows: We had 9 residents participating in our girls' life-skills program at different times across the quarter and 7 residents in our boys' home. The active achievement rate of youth 16 years and older was as follows:

- 6 Total residents 16 or older (4 girls, 2 boys)
- Job seeking and Job performance of the 6 residents, 3 had jobs, 3 residents have referrals into OOD.
- Meal planning 91% 13% increase
- Shopping List 88% -10% increase
- Meal Prep 93% - 14% increase

All residents 14 older

- Chore completion 75%
- Laundry completion 95% - 2% increase
- Weekly Life-skills Lessons 92%
- 7 of 16 residents received 75% or more in all areas
- 6 of 18 residents received 80% or more in all areas.
- 5 of 18 residents received 90% or more in all areas.
- 3 of 18 residents received a 100% in all areas
- Girls were 82% and higher of 6 of the 6 on hands areas.

STAFF AND RESIDENTS BEGINNING WITH US

Residents: We welcomed three new girls and two new boys.

Staff: We hired one new female staff and two male staff.

SAYING GOODBYE

Residents:

Three girls were discharged, one emancipated successfully and moved to MOAB. One needed a higher level of care agreed upon by county and Redemption House, and the other AWOLed abruptly whereabouts unknown.

Two boys were discharged; one moved to a higher level of care at the discretion of his parent and county. The other was an emergency placement that was moved to the proper level of care.

Staff:

All our staff have stayed with us and we are looking to add to our team.

HOW ARE WE BEHAVING?

Positive Performers

We love to catch our young ones doing well. Between both homes we wrote 219 rewards among all residents. We also gave out several weekly rewards for great behavior for those that did not have a critical or minor report in the week.

Number of Restraints:

Boys House: 7 restraints from 3 criticals- 2 restraints/2 criticals in January, 5 restraints/1 critical in February, March 0 😊

Girls House: 11 restraints from 5 criticals- 7 restraints/3 criticals in January, 0 in February 😊, 4 restraints/2 criticals in March.

The boys' home 2 different isolated incidents from 2 different boys on different days in January. Both handled quickly. February 1 critical from a boy in crisis, several restraints, was able to de-escalate. NO patterns.

The girls' home had 2 criticals/6 restraints in January came from same girl who was discharged, the additional restraint was a different resident firm extremity hold from an isolated incident. 2 restraints in March from a young new resident in crisis, handled quickly able to de-escalate. No patterns.

Fresh Starts

Three boys and three girls were eligible to participate in our Aftercare Program in the last quarter.

-1 girl graduated from aftercare successfully and is doing well in college. We are beyond excited about her future!

- 2 girls remain in aftercare both girls emancipated the foster care system both Bridges eligible. Both are at MOAB house, an independent living home. We are so proud of both young ladies.

- 1 boy graduated from aftercare. He remains in a foster home and is doing well.

-2 boys remain in aftercare. One emancipated the foster care system and is bridges eligible. He is at MOAB house, an independent living home. He has transitioned well. The other young man reunified home with his mother and siblings and is doing well.



We continue to partner with the faculty at Rush church in Boardman. The residents can attend Youth Group on Wednesday evenings and church service on Sundays. We currently have approximately 14-17 boys and girls that attend regularly. We celebrated the baptism for one young lady in March.



We are serviced by the Village Network for our counseling, medication management, and group needs.

Out of 23 residents, being served are as follows:

 Residents not on psychotropics- 2

Critical Incidents

Boys

21 reportable CIR's containing 41 Incidents... This was a decrease of 10 critical from previous quarter. The highest areas of incidents were 7 restraints, and 5 incidents of self-mutilation. The largest month with incidents was in January with 19 incidents which is average, then slowly decreased to 14 incidents in February, and further decreased to 8 incidents in March. No pattern involving residents or staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Girls

70 reportable CIR's, containing 100 incidents... This is a substantial increase from previous quarter. The largest areas of incidents were 38 self-mutilations involving multiple girls, and 20 involvements of law. Two girls were discharged from facility due to excessive behavior and AWOL's. No pattern involving staff to discern that a child was being singled out etc.

Note: Multiple incident behaviors may be involved in one critical. Other unusual incidents – various are not county/state required reporting.

Loving to Learn

Our residents receive their education in the least restrictive environment to best fit their needs. Resident placements as follows:

East Middle School 1
East High School 1
Wilson Alternative Middle 2
Summit Academy Elementary 2
Summit Academy Secondary 10
Valley Virtual 3
Mahoning Valley Community 3
Harding Elementary 1

Progress towards Goals:

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 100% of objectives:
1 girl and 1 boy.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 90%-99% of objectives:
4 girls and 5 boys.

Residents making progress in or already have achieved 80 -89 % of objectives:
3 girls and 1 boy.

Residents making progress in or already having achieved 70-79% of objectives:
1 girl and 2 boys.

Result: 18 of 21 making progress in or already achieved 70% or higher objectives.

OVERALL TOTAL Average –
Girls- ACHIEVED 70%, Made Progress 18%, No progress or have not started 12%

Boys- ACHIEVED 69%, Made progress 20%, No progress or have not started 11%
